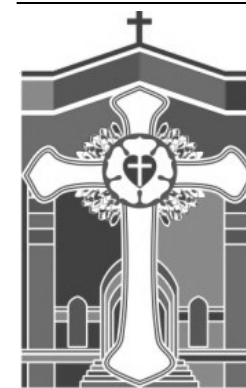

Together, We Are the Church

Why belong to a church? In the days of our parents and grandparents, answers would be vastly different than many of today's churchgoers. In the past people chose the church they attended because of a previous connection to it: they were baptized into it, their spouse grew up there or a friend brought them to it. The person, at the time, usually was not actively looking for a church body to join, but they somehow became intimately connected to the fellowship of believers.

In today's world, completely different factors play into finding a place to worship. Increased mobility, a growing checklist of what churches need to offer, and lack of patience for slow change, all play into finding a new church to join. This has led existing churches to feel like they must place a major focus on marketing themselves to outsiders and has created the birth of many new churches. Recent surveys suggest that

people looking for a new church to attend are most interested in the worship and programs of the church. One thing that is different than in past generations, is that people looking for a new church today do not value attending the same one as their family like in the past.

Since people are choosing their place of worship you would expect that they would be more invested. Sadly, the answer is that those who attend a church and do not create strong bonds with others are less likely to attend regularly or to stay as a member long term. I think this is because the church was never meant to be something to join but instead a gathering of individuals that God has called to gather together and bring God's kingdom down to earth.

The struggle is that there is no such thing as a "perfect church" because God uses sinners like you and me to populate each congregation. Though I believe every church's

goal is to strive to do God's will, we fall short just as we do on a personal level because of our human imperfections. The key is to remember the grace God give us when we fail to live up to his will for our own lives. We must extend that same grace to others and the church where we feel it falls short and continue to work together to do God's will.

Each one of us who worships in a particular place should ask the question "why did God call me here and for what purpose?" When we understand ourselves as being part of the process and not just a user of a product it makes us see things in a different light and attaches some responsibility to us as well.

am service on Sunday, October 27th. Please plan now to attend this very important meeting. I especially want to thank Finance Committee member Andrea Brock who has personally spent many hours leading this effort. Every line of our General Fund budget (which pays for the daily operation of our church) has been examined with an eye toward reducing unnecessary planned expenses. As a result, budget cuts have been made where appropriate. The goal is to craft a balanced budget for next year that will recognize and account for our reduction in monthly General Fund offering receipts compared with previous years’. Your Church Council is now in the process of carefully reviewing this draft budget which will be finalized for presentation at the Annual Meeting. Please continue to pray for God’s guidance as we discern how to be good stewards of His gifts.

As each of you pray about your continued personal contributions of time, talents, and financial support to your church, please keep in mind the following information about our budget. Monetary contributions to our Specially-designated Funds (such as Memorial Fund, GIFT Fund, Capital Improvement Fund, Organ

Fund, Back-pack Ministry, Endowment Fund, etc.) cannot be used for our normal monthly expenses such as administration, salaries, building maintenance, bulletins, Christian Education expenses, Community/ Outreach Programs, etc., which all are funded out of the General Fund. Our General Fund expenses are what is budgeted each year, and our General Fund offering (received from each of you) is the only way to pay for these expenses. Please continue to give regularly (as you are able) to our General Fund offering.

Your Council is always open to hearing any questions, comments, ideas, or concerns from the congregation. Please feel free to contact myself, Pastor, or any Council member.

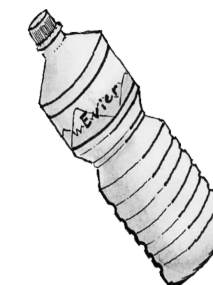
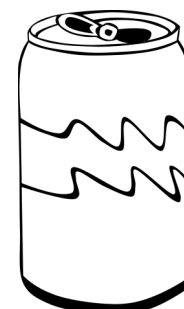


German Fest – Donations Requested

Food Pantry News:

I want to thank you for answering our call for breakfast foods for our clients. I love hearing the surprise in the pantry volunteer’s voices that say, “Did you see what we got today?” “How do people know we only had one box left on the shelf?” “ Where did these goodies come from?” We are so blessed to have such a caring congregation that supports this mission on hunger in our community. I hate to report that the government has once again lowered the amount of money for SNAP benefits. We are seeing letters of people only receiving eight or twelve dollars per month to purchase food. They turn to us to help them feed their families. We have gotten permission to give families extra USDA foods per month, and we are giving extra beans, rice, and canned meats. The USDA recommended that we allow clients to come twice a month. We do not have the volunteer staff to accommodate their recommendations; so, we are giving extra USDA foods on their monthly visits.

I attended the Wood County Food Co-op meeting in September. We are not the only pantry seeing an increase in clients seeking food assistance. Some pantries are thinking of cutting hours and days of service due to lack of volunteers and being overwhelmed with clients. Applications are monitored by the United Way to maintain a master list of visits to local food pantries. Misuse is almost zero.

We will begin taking Christmas basket applications on October 1. Our applications are only for our clients. We are planning on preparing sixty baskets. If you would like to sponsor a family, the cost will be \$10.00 per family . Any donation amount would be appreciated. You can make donations now and mark your check or offering envelope for food pantry/Christmas basket.

Our food needs for next month will be spaghetti sauce or macaroni and cheese or instant mashed potatoes. We will take any food or toiletry you offer this ministry.

Shandra Ice can still use your newspaper coupons to purchase much needed toiletries. Just bring them to the church office or slide them under the choir room door.

FLC Community Garden, September 23, 2019

If the calendar and weather weren't telling us that growing season is fading for the community garden, a glance in that direction is confirmation. The last of the bean plants have been removed and the tomato plants are browning from the ground up. Of course, work remains, as the garden must be prepared for winter and spring. The many weeds that have worked hard to stake their claim will be back in the spring, so there is cutting and mulching and tilling to get done. This summer has been difficult for the garden and gardeners. Although there was financial support from the church and from Thrivent, workers were in limited supply. With the events of the spring and summer at the Lockney house, time to commit to gardening was in short supply, so my presence was not what it should have been. Thanks especially to valiant efforts by Jarad Ice, Don Ery, Ann and Mike Struble, Regis Jones and a few others we were able to get a reasonable harvest, but it was a steady struggle to stay ahead of uninvited wildlife. There will be a final major work day on September 28 to start garden cleanup, and all hands are welcome, as are suggestions for the future of the community garden.
