## The Lenten Spiritual Journey

Last year at this time, I was getting ready to head to the Holy Land in order to walk in the footsteps of Jesus. As with most people who have traveled there, I came back with a new perspective and outlook on my faith because I was able to better grasp the culture, climate and history of the region in which Jesus and the disciples lived. However, the biggest change to my understanding of scriptures is that the Bible is not just listing places where Jesus visited as an afterthought, but instead these places are essential to understanding the full story of Jesus.

This epiphany that I experienced last year has made me see that Jesus' journey to the cross was choreographed by God in order to share a fuller picture of God's love for us. When we seek to understand the significance of the places that Jesus leads us to in his last days, it allows us to understand more fully the events that took place.

During our Lenten journey this year, both the devotional "Places of the Passion" and the mid-week services will seek to give us better insights not only to Jesus' journey to the cross, but the places he encountered. Each week starting with Ash Wednesday, which is February 17th, we will be reflecting on a place that Jesus visited in His last days and the importance of it to Jesus' triumphant over sin, death and the devil.

On Tuesdays in Lent, I will be doing a brief talk on Facebook Live about the historical and cultural significance of the places we will journey to for the week. Then on Wednesdays at the noon Service of the Word (In person only) and 7pm Holden Evening Prayer Service (In Person and On Facebook Live), I will be focusing on the theological importance of the place and events that happened there. On this journey, we will be traveling to the small town of Bethany for Jesus' anointing and to the places of power in Jesus' day, such as the courtyard of the High Priest and Pontius Pilate's court. We will visit the Mount of Olives on which the Messiah was to ascend from and the quiet Garden of Gethsemane where the rowdy mob encounters Christ.

Since over the last year most of us have been weary to travel anywhere, why not take this time to journey with Jesus this Lenten season as He leads us to experience new life.

## **Church Council**

## FROM YOUR COUNCIL PRESIDENT -

As you know, council elected <u>not</u> to call our customary January Congregational meeting this year. The January meeting is normally a time to look back and celebrate the many accomplishments from the past year. We felt fortunate to have held a successful in-person Congregational meeting last fall, and decided we could still celebrate our many accomplishments without the January in-person meeting, and disseminate our Annual Report by other means. The 2020 Annual Report has just been sent out electronically through our "One Call" system, and printed copies are being made available to those without email. Please notify the church office if you are a member and have not received your copy. As you read the report, I pray you will be amazed at all we have accomplished during the COVID pandemic. Even during times when indoor worship, meetings, and our favorite events were cancelled, our church remained active in many different and creative ways to continue reaching out to our parishioners and to our community. For me personally, the report showed me that I belong to a healthy, strong, and resilient church capable of providing ministry to others during the hardships of COVID. I am very thankful for that!

On behalf of council, I wish to once again personally thank each of you who were able to support our church financially throughout last year. Council continually watched for ways to reduce expenses, and were able to continue paying our staff salaries throughout the entire year with the help of a forgivable Payroll Protection loan. We will not be getting another government loan in 2021, so we are asking for your continued faithful giving during this upcoming year.

I am sad to report that our recently hired Office Administrator, Barbara Huffman, did not work out and is no longer with us. Amanda Whitlatch has agreed to continue supporting our office work on a part-time basis, although she will not hold regular office hours. A dedicated cell phone is being carried by Amanda to monitor calls into the church office during days when she is not there. Amanda will listen to and relay messages left on the church's voicemail, but if you need to reach Pastor Ian please continue to call him directly on his cell phone.

Election of council officers was held at our January council meeting. Paul Freeman was elected Vice President, and Jarad Ice was elected Secretary. The President's position has not been filled as of this writing. I am currently leading discussions on how big the President's roles and responsibilities have become over the years, making the position more difficult to fill. I will remain as Council President until voting

resumes at our February meeting.

Council was made aware of several new issues and concerns with our property. We have a list of repair and upgrade projects, but volunteers from the congregation are still needed to assist with finding contractors who can do the work. Council approved \$5,000 for a much-needed upgrade to our church's network and computer backup systems. Jarad Ice has graciously volunteered to use his expertise in this area to manage this project and provide installation and configuration assistance. Council also approved \$5,000 for replacement of several faulty spotlights above the chancel. I will be managing that project once warranty issues are resolved.

Your Church Council is always open to hearing any questions, comments, ideas, or concerns from the congregation. Please feel free to contact myself, Pastor Ian, or any Council member. May God pour out His rich and abundant blessings on each of you this Christmas season and throughout the New Year in 2021!


## **PANCAKE SUPPER to benefit VBS**

## Food Pantry News:

Your food pantry closed out the year with the completion and gifting of 67 Christmas baskets and 71 families served in December. Your last minute donations allowed us to serve clients that were put on a wait list.

I have been surprised and very thankful for the food drop offs that you have brought to the church. I'm always asking, "who donated this?, "or "how did they know we needed this?". I'm beginning to think that there is a secret group of helpers floating around the church. We were getting low on cereal and I walk in and there were cases of cereal inside the back door. Not boxes, but cases. Then we got turkey breasts and boxed food delivered on two different days. Then a friend of a church member has delivered over 40 individual pounds of ground hamburger. The food pantry staff are so thankful to everyone that has donated your time and gifts to make the pantry a success this past year.

We feel truly blessed that you support the pantry financially and with donated food items.

Now we start the Souper Bowl competition. A drop off table has been placed in the narthex to place your cans of soup if you attend Sunday worship. You can also drop your soup donation at the handicapped entrance during food pantry hours of 9:30 and 11:30am on Tuesday or Wednesday.

The competition will be divided by boundaries this year instead of different services. There will be a South Parkersburg that includes Lubeck, Washington, Mineral Wells and North Parkersburg that includes Vienna and Williamstown, and the state of Ohio.

You will need to label your soup donation for the area you live. Write in the memo of your check and offering envelope that it's for food pantry soup and the area you want to get credit. Please write SOUTH, NORTH OR OHIO. May the best neighbors win! Every dollar donated will equal one can of soup in the soup totals. Pastor Ian will keep us informed weekly on the total donated for each week at his discretion. We all know how much he loves this competition. The boundaries were his idea. We don't need cream of mushroom soup, but would love to receive other types of any brand.

Due to the Covid-19 situation, we will run the competition until February the 28th. This should give our members the time they need to make their donations. Enjoy Souper Bowl 2021!!

## FLC SEXTON IMPORTANT 'COG' IN THE WORK OF KEEPING FIRST LUTHERAN OPEN FOR WORSHIP

When people hear the word 'Sexton' they often ask ... what is a Sexton?? Historically, according to the dictionary, a church Sexton "...is a custodian charged with keeping the church and parish buildings prepared for meetings, caring for church equipment, and performing related minor duties such as ringing the bell and digging graves..."

Our Sexton, Stewart Shaw, has been essentially performing those duties since November, 1989 ... when he assumed the position from Bob and Lila Eagle ... with the exception of ringing the bells and digging graves!

Stewart keeps busy cleaning, dusting, sweeping, polishing the brass handrails in the Sanctuary, re-arranging the set up of various rooms and the Fellowship Hall for a variety of activities, and assisting in other areas when called upon.

He has seen and been involved with a lot of gradual changes and the shifting needs of our Church. He saw the major revise of our classrooms, the Archive room moved to a new home to provide a new residence for the Sr. Choir. And then there were the many, many 'faces' of the "Blue Room" at the foot of the Fellowship Hall stairs – serving as a variety of youth and adult classrooms and other uses – to its present resident ... our Food Pantry!

His current 'office' next to the lift was the original Food Pantry ... and some members will remember that the current Prayer Chapel was once the Church Secretary's office and the Pastor's study was in the parish house.

Stewart has been present for some major changes as well. Some of these he recalled were the addition of handicap restrooms, upgrading of the handicap entrance in the alley, new red carpet in the Sanctuary (which replaced the old green carpet ... and would you believe ... they found green linoleum under the old carpet?!?)

More recently, Stewart – always ready to assist – helped Dale Van de Velde install the security cameras.

Then there was the upheaval due to the major update of our electrical system in the Sanctuary, and the wonderful upgrade of the Fellowship Hall restrooms.

All this being said ... who would have ever thought about the major changes that would be required over the past year that we have all experienced. The dreaded Corona Virus-19 made us all review our priorities of cleanliness ... and Stewart was up to the challenge this presented for our Church.

He continued with his daily/weekly routines about the Church, with the added necessity of special deep-cleaning and sanitization required for all "touch" surfaces, light switches, faucets, all door handles, etc., etc. Just as all of us have had to assess our homes and their 'new' requirements for safety during the pandemic, so has it been required for our Church home as well. And occasionally the pews have had to be resanitized if there have been services, funerals, etc. during the week in addition to regular Sunday services.

All in all, Stewart has been an important 'cog' this past year, helping us have a good and safe place for worship at First Lutheran. We have been fortunate to have worshipped every Sunday – some weeks safely in-person, other Sundays on Facebook LIVE only. This has been possible because of all of us working together ... our Sexton Stewart, in cooperation with Pastor Ian and Becca, and all the members of the "Quaran-Team" worship leaders, the re-opening committee, the Usher team, and our Food Pantry workers who have continued to help those who come to us in need during this difficult time.

We give praise and thanks to God for all of those who have worked ... and continue to work ... to keep us safe and able to worship together as the people – and community – of

First Lutheran Church.

## **Liberty Street Community Garden in 2021**

We will start out with these cabbage plants, some onion sets and maybe lettuce in early or mid-March, then quickly follow those plantings in early April with peas and we are off!

The FLC community garden is maintained to provide some fresh veggies to the FLC food pantry, folks who are shut-in, and church attendees as we are able. With the good soil and convenience of the Liberty Street garden next to the church, we should be able to get fresh vegetables to many in the community. Thanks to Rural King this year donating LOTS of seeds and Eli Reid separating and tabulating them, we have a good start on the season. We received a grant last year from Thrivent Financial to help with supplies and equipment, and may qualify again this year. Donations are always welcome!

We will need to do some work to get the garden ready for planting, so many hands are needed between now and April. Especially in the spring weeks, garden work opportunities are often controlled by the weather. For the time being, work days and times will be announced to all those interested using email, text, or phone.
