

We have just started into the church season of Lent and turning our focus to the Passion narrative of Jesus Christ. At this time, we traditionally are used to hearing messages about how to focus on developing one's spiritual walk and disciplines. However, when I began to read Jesus' Passion account this year, something stood out to me. Jesus spends an extraordinary amount of time telling the disciples that they needed to be aware of the time and context in which they are living in. Jesus is quite clear that some times are meant for self-enrichment and other times for caring for one's neighbor. We are able to discern the different times by being observant of what is happening in the world and by the work of the Holy Spirit on our hearts and minds.

The disciples are unable to grasp why Mary would waste good oil on Jesus' feet when they are gathered with Jesus for an ordinary occasion. (Mark 14:1-10) What the disciples had not come to realize is that any time one can feel Christ's presence in their life, it is to be valued. The fellowship with one another is also something they assume will always be there. The disciples within a few days will be called to the ends of the world, and the twelve disciples will not have the benefit of this time of fellowship with one another and Jesus. Whereas the woman recognizes that this moment is special and that times are changing and that they should value where they are in the present and prepare for the future.

A Time for Sharing

Jesus later on invites his disciples to gather at the Garden of Gethsemane to pray for him. (Mark 14:32-42) Jesus opens up to Peter, James, and John about His concerns, and He asks them to keep Him in prayer at the present time. At the time that his closest friends could reach out and support Him and pray to God fervently that Jesus might have strength and peace, they slept. I am sure it is not that they did not care about Jesus, but they failed to embrace the need in the present moment. Jesus stated multiple times what He would have to go through, and Peter and the disciples instead of being comforting, dismissed Jesus's reality. What the disciples will learn through the Passion is that everyone, including the Son of God, has struggles they have to overcome, and it is through compassionately listening to their concerns and prayer for them in the present moment that we can be a blessing to our friends and neighbors.

Finally, Jesus teaches us what it means to be a follower of Christ. In Mark 14:27, Jesus predicts that Peter and the rest of the disciples will fall away out of fear. Peter not only says that he will never leave Jesus, but when Christ is arrested, Peter is willing to take up the sword to change the circumstances. Jesus rebukes Peter and says that scripture must be fulfilled for it is God's will. What Jesus is asking from His followers is not to change the circumstances of the world, but to be observant of how God is working in the world. The women did not come to Calvary reluctantly to see a friend hung on a cross, but instead they witness their salvation earned for them. They gather at the tomb early in the morning to prepare Jesus's body for decomposition, and yet they witness the hope of bodily resurrection. The disciples gather in fear of what the world can do to them, and Christ allows them to touch and see that God can bring healing to our deepest wounds.

My point in writing all this is that it seems to me that through this pandemic, we have had plenty of time to self-reflect and focus on our needs. At the present time, I see many people within the church and outside of it that are fearful of the future and struggling to find hope. Therefore, during this Lenten season, I want to encourage you to take some time to reach out to those who you have been out of contact with and place value on just being present with each other. When your friends and family open up to you with their cares and concerns, listen with compassion and earnestly pray for them while they are present. When you get wearied by the ways of the world, know that we are not called to change the world by ourselves, but instead called to be witnesses of God overcoming all evil. By doing this, not only will we be a blessing to those we live amongst, but we also will grow individually and become closer to God just as Lent is supposed to be.

FROM YOUR COUNCIL PRESIDENT -

As I reported in last month's article, the office of Council President was not filled during January's council meeting because of how big the President's role and responsibilities have become. As a response to this situation, I called a special Executive Board meeting to discuss this issue. Together we came up with a plan to restructure our council into "teams" or "committees" in order to divvy up work tasks that previously fell on the president to handle. Paul Freeman did a ton of research on this subject, which led to development of the following list of 6 council-led committees. Here is a preliminary description of these committees:

MUTUAL MINISTRY – will be the "Human Resources" arm of council – in charge of job descriptions, staffing policies, personnel records, performance reviews, filling staff vacancies, etc.

WORSHIP & MUSIC – supporting our worship services and everything pertaining to worship – choir and other music, Altar Guild, acolytes, crucifers, ushers, lectors, communion assistants, audio/video/ lighting.

PROPERTY - oversee the maintenance, repair, and upkeep of our aging facility. Oversee capital improvement projects. Manage the role of Property Coordinator.

OUTREACH – encourage individuals and groups to witness for Christ by sharing their faith in word and deed. Welcome new members into our congregation. Oversee events we put on for parishioners and for the community, manage use of our facilities, etc.

EDUCATION – assess and respond to meet the educational needs of our

congregation, covering all age groups. Sunday School, VBS, youth & family, catechism & confirmation, Camp Luther, etc.

FINANCE – advise, assist, and support the Treasurer in carrying out their duties. Monitor and report on investment performance. Advise council on financial health of congregation.

This new council structure was presented at February's council meeting and was wholeheartedly accepted. Nominations for Council President were then held, and I accepted a nomination for this "new" Council President's role. I look forward to leading council through a transition to this new structure, which I believe will ultimately benefit the entire congregation. The transition will take several months, so stay tuned for further updates!

In other council business, we discussed and approved funds for several new maintenance issues including emergency replacement of a bad pump motor for the Education Building heating system, and replacement of floor tiles damaged by water in the children's play area of the Fellowship Hall. Equipment has arrived for the computer network upgrade, and Jarad Ice will schedule installation soon. Our January financial report was very favorable, with January income just \$172 short of meeting January expenses. You can find January's financial numbers on page 3 of this newsletter. On behalf of council, I wish to thank each of our congregation members for continuing to faithfully support our church as you are able. Council reviewed our WV State COVID numbers which have continued to

decrease, and decided to reopen our facilities for certain additional approved activities. A list of these approved facility uses can be found on page 9 of this newsletter. And for those of you who have chosen to attend Sunday and Wednesday inperson worship services, isn't it great to be able to worship with your fellow parishioners again? I think I can see light at the end of the tunnel (and it's not an oncoming train)!


Lastly, here are a couple of friendly reminders:
